Call to Order and Announcements

Pat Dabbert

Meeting was called to order at 5:40 pm by Chair, Pat Dabbert.

Announcements:

Pat Dabbert announced that the Austin Independent School District (AISD) will hold an AISD Back to School Bash, August 11, 2007 from 9:00 am to 1:00 pm at the Delco Center located at 4601 Pecan Brook Dr. AISD Coordinator is Beverly Reeves at 414-9882.

Citizens Communication:

Richard Franklin from the African American Mentoring Project provided a video and brief overview of the African American Mentoring Project (AAMP) implemented at Covington Middle School. He outlined the projects mentoring activities, objectives, and how they build self-esteem, academic performance, reinforce positive attitudes about school, strengthen social relationships, emphasize connectivity and teamwork, improve attendance, enhance youths ability to problem solve and resolve conflicts. Richard expressed the need for this project to continue in the Austin, TX community to provide an alternative for African American youth to excel in school and their communities. Currently, Richard is seeking funding to provide the African American Mentoring Project (AAMP) to over 155 students in the 2007-2008 school years at a cost of \$400.00 per student.

Review and Approve Meeting Summary

The June minutes were approved as presented.

IAG Update: IAG Guidelines and Designation Process

Vanessa Sarria reviewed the IAG guidelines process and discussed that the Resource Council did not have an opportunity to review and approve the guidelines. The IAG guidelines will be on the Resource Council agenda for the August 10, 2007 meeting. Vanessa stated that there was a lot of feedback on both the IAG guidelines and the process. The Community Council will be asked to provide input during the CAN IAG Designation Process. Two groups, the Literacy Coalition and the Capital Area Regional Transit Coordination Committee have requested to be considered for designation. Vanessa discussed that after the Resource Council has approved the IAG guidelines and designation process she will present information on the groups to be considered at the Community Council meeting of September 17, 2007.

Equity in Opportunity Youth Forum

Suzanne Hershey, from (Ready by 21 Coalition), Deborah Wise, Annette Strauss Institute at the University of Texas at Austin,

Todd Moore (United Way), Peg Gavin (LifeWorks) and Scott O'Brien (LifeWorks), and Sue Carpenter (United Way Capital Area).

The presentation provided an extensive overview of the substantial progress with the Ready by 21 Coalition and how it relates to today's youth.

The following areas were identified as vision for youth in our community:

- Ready for higher education and learning
- Ready for work and career advancement
- Ready to lead healthy lives
- Ready for positive social and civic connections and engagement.

Deborah Wise, had the honor to present the newly appointed Youth Council to the entire CAN Community Counicl. Each Youth Council member received a Certificate from the Ready By 21 Coalition for their commitment to be a Youth Council member, supporting their communities through leadership and serving on an advisory body to represent the diverse needs and goals of young people in the community. Deborah outlined the mission of the Youth Council and that the Youth Council had already received an endorsement from the Austin City Council and Austin Independent School District (AISD) School Board.

Autumn Washington, McCallum High, Mikaylah Bowman, Out of School, Hollie Parks, West Lake High Tim Eubanks, Austin Voices for Education and Youth described the creation of the Youth Council and their list of current activities to date. He discussed the Youth Council's objectives, training for the up-coming year, and training/mentoring opportunities with elected officials, their aids, and other Council Representatives. Tim Eubanks acknowledged and thanked Angelo McHorse, intern at Austin Voices for Education and Youth, for his instrumental work the Youth Council. The next Youth Council meeting will be July 23, 2007.

Discussion: Members identified the need to connect more with the community to create in-depth dialogue on the Foster Care issues. There is an understanding about issues and many people in the community involved however, the member encouraged creating a platform to continue the discussion. Community Council members identified some additional community responses: Cynthia Colbert, Catholic Charities of Central Texas, provided additional information on the faith-based community getting more involved with the issues presented on transitional youth and homeless youth. Clint Smith, Gray Panthers provided insight to the Youth Partners on ways to engage the business community with transitional youth.

The Community Council members asked the Youth Council what supports they need at this time:

- Providing Funding to support the Youth Council members with stipends.
- Funding for marketing the Youth Council in the community.
- Supportive and open format that empowers youth members to establish the framework and priorities of the Youth Council.
- Leadership and team-building training to prepare Youth Council members for effective service; seminars and shadowing opportunities where adults/elected officials share their leadership experience with Youth Council members.
- An adult mentor for each youth Council member.
- Engage Austin Representatives Officials to schedule time to meet with the Youth Council and provide training to the Youth Council on civic engagement.
- Incentives and support services such as child care, transportation, etc.
- Meeting space for the Youth Council monthly meeting, admin support, voice mail, etc.

Next Steps:

What can the Community Council do to support current efforts?

Suzanne Hershey recommended the following current efforts:

What is next? Begin a community conversation by:

- Identifying ways to better connect the various initiatives underway to provide quality services to youth.
- Coordinating a dialogue on Foster Care issues in our community.
- Endorse and support the Youth Council.
- Inviting the community to provide affordable housing for transitional youth (Foster Care Youth)
- Invite the National program "Kids Count" back to speak with our community.
- Measure our progress with CAN, Issues Area Groups (IAG) and Youth issues.
- Adopt the continuum framework to assess the "big picture" for children and youth, reduce fragmented efforts. Ask: "Where does this fit?"
- Encourage other planning groups to utilize the continuum from birth to 21 to track initiatives/indicators and to use the Youth Services Mapping (YSM) system pilot to track services available to high school stage youth in Travis County at http://www.readyby21austin.org/youth-data.php.Advocate for inclusion of the youth voice in program and resource decisions affecting youth.

Suzanne Hershey suggested that we set shared goals to change the odds for youth by preparing youth for College, Work, and Life. Ready by 21Coalition invited the Community Council members to attend a Ready by 21 meeting held the **second Thursday of each month**, **from 9:00 - 11:00 a.m. WorkSource**, **6505 Airport Boulevard**, **Suite 101E.** CAN staff will send out details.
